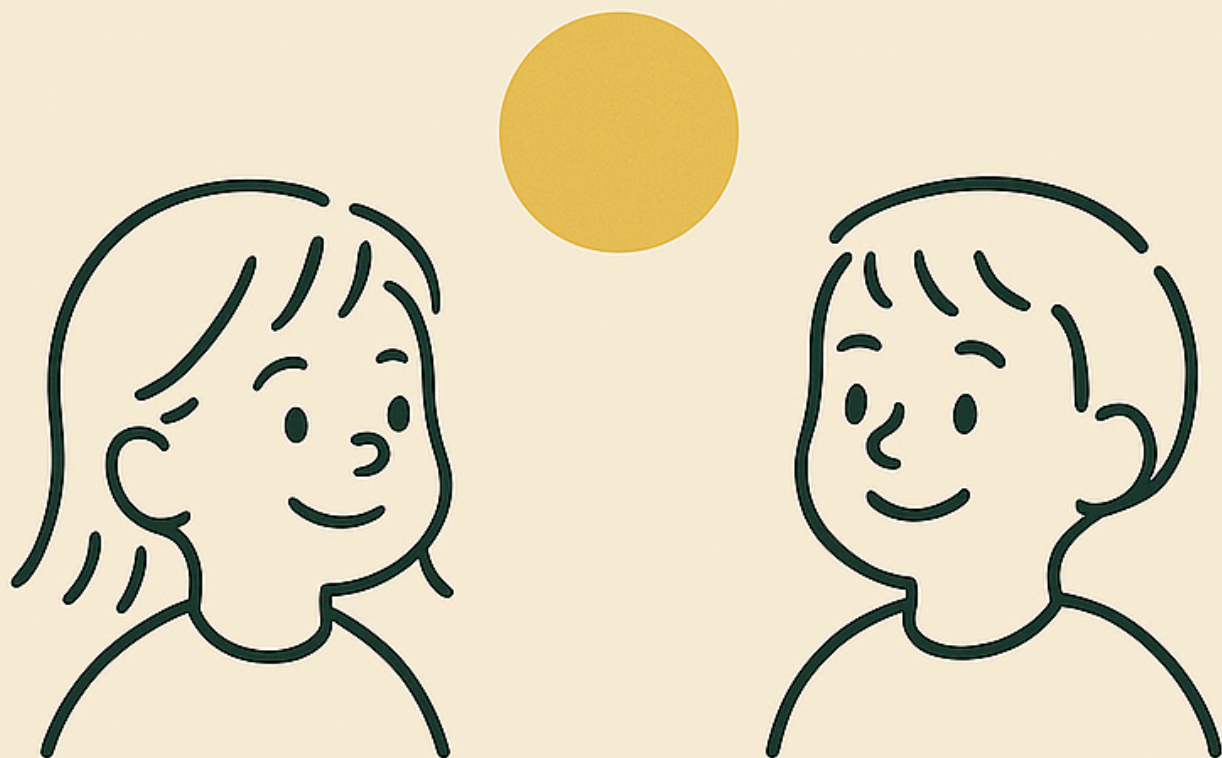

and his mind even wider.

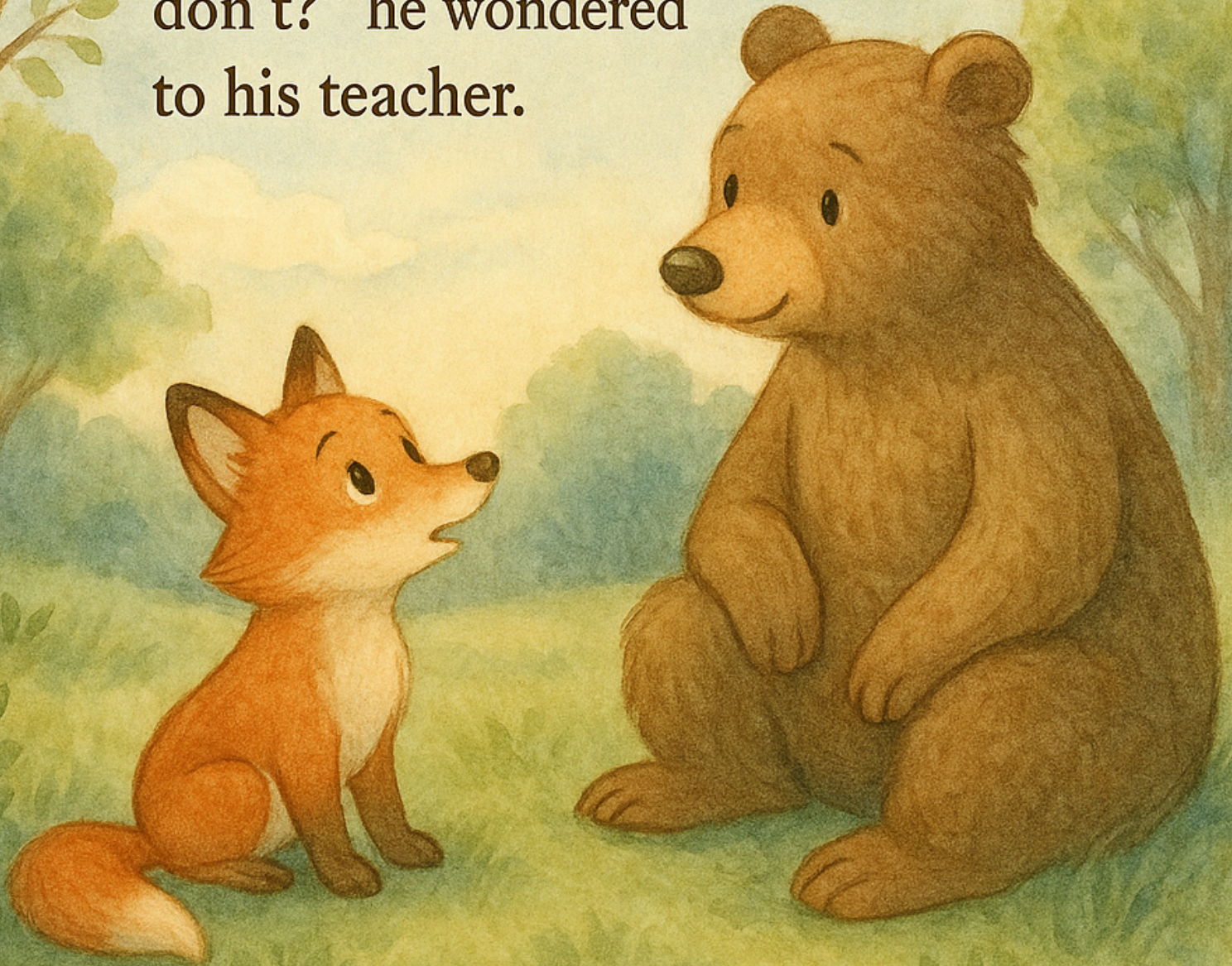
“Why is the sky blue

the mailman.





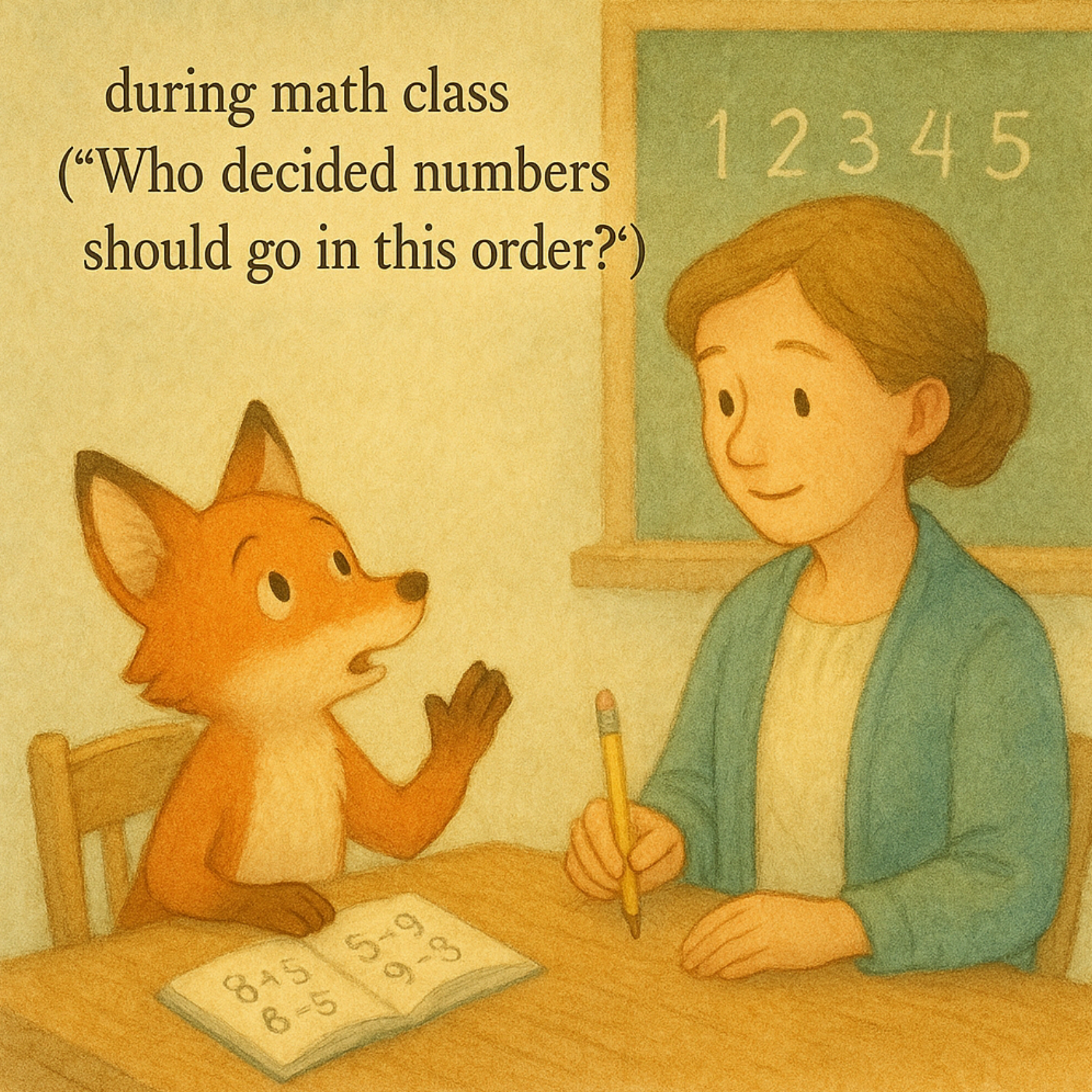
Nico's questions bubbled up constantly,
